Sebec Lake Association - Please join now!

We still need to increase the number of dues-paying members; we still have **less than** 25% of property owners willing to pay the \$15 to join SLA. We need help to increase our member numbers and our best recruiting tool is word of mouth. What we realize is that we need the help of camp owners to talk to their neighbors and friends about SLA, what we do, and to encourage them to join.

Our dues continue to be **\$15 per year**, and if we can get a higher percentage of camp owners to join, we won't be facing continuing financial deficits. Our costs include printing and mailing newsletters to *every* camp owner (and many camps have multiple owners) *whether or not they have paid dues*, website fees, and now, with the IPP, costs for equipment to do the shoreline mapping. Again, at the 2015 annual meeting, it was decided because our financial situation continues to head in the wrong direction, we cut our donation for Homecoming fireworks in half to \$500, and cut by 75% our support of the Maine Volunteer Lake Monitoring Program (VLMP) for the services they provide to us, including free classes and training for Lake volunteers including plant identification, training classes, water clarity testing support, training and equipment. **PLEASE consider joining SLA...**

It happens to all of us: you are reading this Newsletter, you tell yourself you are going to join....then the Newsletter gets put on that stack of 'To Do Later'...This time, do it NOW... The SLA will really appreciate it...

Invasive Plant Patrol & Lake Mapping Update

The SLA initiated its comprehensive Invasive Plant monitoring and Lake Mapping program this past summer. SLA is committed in maintaining vigilance in the face of increasing threats from invasive plants, such as Eurasian Milfoil and Hydrilla.

These two species of invasive plant, which can take over and effectively 'kill' the lake, continue to make their way farther into Maine. How does this happen? Fragments of these invaders arrive on boats, trailers, fishing equipment, PWCs, canoes, kayaks, waders, skis, tubes and even kids' toys.

In response to this threat, a monitoring team was formed and training initiated in June of 2015. SLA and the IPP team are working closely with the Maine Volunteer Lake Monitoring Program (VLMP), which provides the training sessions. SLA also has formed a collaboration with the Foxcroft Academy, bringing interested students into the effort. The team has gotten off to a good start, meeting most of a set of ambitious goals this past summer. Following a classroom training session, an 'on water' session took place at Greeley's Landing, which resulted in the marina area being mapped as to its current aquatic vegetation. No invasive species were found. Having gained this experience, the team then built several custom viewing instruments – trunk scopes- that were used for the next mapping session focusing on the immediate area around the Newell Cove boat launch. This area was also found to be free of invasive plants, though there is much more to do. These first two sessions were so very important, as they gave us excellent insight into what methods of mapping are going to work best for SLA. Sebec Lake is unique in many ways, and presents some challenges that other Maine lakes don't. Though the team would have liked to have gotten more done, they are happy with the outcome when weighed against an ambitious plan and the complicated nature of getting volunteers to donate time during the summer season.

To date, the IPP effort has been funded out of specific donations from camp owners. Without camp owner support, whether financial or in time and equipment, and camp owner vigilance of the waters around them, this program just won't work. With this support, the team was able to quickly respond to camp owners reporting 'something different' in the water to a team member for an evaluation. On behalf of the full team, and the SLA board, the IPP team is very grateful to all of you who have made contributions.

And for the summer of 2016? Mapping, mapping and more mapping! See you in a few months.

What you can do to support the IPP initiative:

First and foremost, **volunteer to be on the IPP team**. If you'd like to volunteer, contact SLA President Brian Woodworth at 207-217-0962 or Board member Rudy Davis at 978-204-6799. Or, you can contact them by email via the SLA website.

Second, **volunteer your small boat**, **kayak or canoe** to the effort for a few hours every now and then.

Third, make a dedicated **financial contribution** to the effort. The team will need additional equipment: logs, view scopes, maps, identification books, specialized rakes, etc., and additional training. When you donate, please make a note on your Membership form or your check memo that it's for the IPP.

Fourth, if you are not a current member of SLA, **join**. Annual dues are only \$15.00, and the return – protection of your lakeside asset – is immense.

Finally, become educated about this threat, and make sure the equipment and 'toys' you put in the water, or that any visitors may put in the water, are **appropriately washed**, **cleaned and inspected** prior to going in.

SLA is run completely by volunteers. We have a Board of Directors, headed by President Brian Woodworth, who conduct business via email and at the annual Directors meeting. New Smelt Study at Sebec Lake - Tim Obrey, IF&W Biologist

Last spring Inland Fisheries & Wildlife began a new study at Sebec and Moosehead Lakes that will help us develop catch indices for rainbow smelt at various life stages. We plan to monitor long term trends in abundance and identify factors that may impact survival for this important forage species for salmon and lake trout.

Work began about 10 days after we observed adult smelt spawning in the tributaries. We installed a plankton net for about 20 minutes at the lower end of the streams to determine if we could capture any newly hatched smelt fry. Our work was very successful and we caught many smelt during this trial run.

We returned to Sebec Lake throughout the summer to sample smelt fry. We were able to capture them on the surface during daylight hours until early June. By mid-June the young smelt began to drop deeper in the lake as they develop a negative reaction to light. We know that after these young smelt reach a certain length, they go to deeper water during the day time, but after the sun sets, they begin a migration to the surface to feed on plankton. So, in July we conducted some day time vs night time trials to determine if we could capture smelt using our surface sampling equipment. We captured just 3 smelt during the daylight trials but at night we took over 250 fish. Since the main objective for this phase of the project was to test trawling methods, only further testing will determine if 250 indicates an abundant or a low smelt population.

We also collected plankton samples in addition to the smelt sampling. Our goal is to be able to correlate plankton abundance with smelt abundance since studies indicate smelt fry survival is related to the abundance of rotifers in the spring. Rotifers are very small plankton species that can only be seen with a microscope. It is very timeconsuming to count the plankton so we are still processing these samples over the winter.

Sebec, Maine: The beginning...

The name Sebec is derived from Sebecco, the Indian name for the lake. It is one of the six townships granted to Bowdoin College by Massachusetts in 1794. Sebec consisted of 22,228 acres, and was originally divided into lots by Moses Hodsdon in 1802.

In May 1803, the Treasurer of Bowdoin College deeded 16,000 acres to Richard Pike, 75 cents per acre. In 1804, Pike sold one-sixteenth of the lots to Benjamin Wyatt, soon after David and Charles Coffin, Mary Pike, and Phillip Combs bought equal shares.

The outlet of Sebec Lake included an 18-foot fall. Here the first mills in the county were built, and around it Sebec Village was clustered. In 1804, Samuel Kimball, Mark Trafton, and others here built a dam, put up a mill and the first framed building raised in the county. Roger Chase built the gearing and put a saw and gristmill in operation, in which the first boards were sawed and the first grain ground in the county.

In 1805 one-eighth of the mill, dam, and land connected was sold to Moses Greenleaf. According to Stephen Snow of Milo, the gristmill was running in 1806. One of the first settlers were Ezekiel Chase who was a Revolutionary War Soldier. He loved to roam the forest wilderness, and was a hunter. His lot, cleared in 1802 was on the bank of the river near what was later Sebec Depot. In 1803, he raised crops and hay, built a log cabin then brought his family. During the trip up the river they met up with Benjamin Sargent on his way to Milo. In 1814, Charles Vaughan Chase was born in Sebec. Abel Chase, a brother, settled in town.

Sebec, the oldest incorporated town in the county, was incorporated February 28, 1812. In 1870 the population was 964, and the town valuation was \$190,407.00.
